



BIOFORTIFIED CORN BOOSTS NUTRITION

Fifty percent of Mayan children in Guatemala under five years of age suffer chronic malnutrition. These children may get enough food to feel full but not enough nutrients. This “hidden hunger” results in stunted mental and physical growth. Guatemala ranks fifth in the world for childhood stunting.

Like their ancestors before them, subsistence Mayan farmers in Guatemala grow the corn consumed in their families’ corn based diet. To improve on this low nutrient diet, the SHARE project is working in 14 remote Mayan communities with several food security interventions including fruit and vegetable production. Now the project also includes growing a new variety of corn – biofortified corn.

Following the successful development of biofortified seeds for Africa, and after years of research and plant breeding by the world’s best seed scientists, a new biofortified corn variety for Guatemala

was developed. Field trials were completed in a variety of zones of the country. Then the new corn passed taste and cooking tests. This new biofortified corn has two and a half times the quality protein of the traditional corn and 50% more zinc, an essential nutrient for the growth and health of young children. This biofortified corn has the potential to reduce malnutrition without changing the traditional diet.

For these subsistence farmers it was important that the corn is high yielding, low cost, drought resistant and that the variety is open pollinated. This means that farmers can save the seeds each year for planting the next crop and can share seeds with neighbours.

Last fall SHARE’s partner in eastern Guatemala attained biofortified seed for 60 farmers in the SHARE project communities. The technician working in the SHARE project provided training and

assistance and is tracking results. The harvest was good and the farmers were pleased with the crop.

CHECK UP ON SUSTAINABILITY IN THE "PUMPS FOR FOOD" PROJECT

SHARE is constantly checking on the ongoing progress of prior projects to assess effectiveness and long term results. SHARE checks for sustainability.

When Mark Cullen and his friend Dr. Jim Clubine joined SHARE to visit a cooperative farm in a remote area of the Dry Corridor of El Salvador, they immediately saw the potential of the small scale irrigation system that SHARE had recently funded there. Mark and Jim raised funds for the "Pumps for Food" initiative which, over 3 years, supplied pumps, pipes and sprinklers to many farmer groups in Honduras and El Salvador.

This year, SHARE requested a report to determine if the irrigation systems

are functioning. Our checkup showed that the cooperative groups are still carefully maintaining the irrigation systems. SHARE's partners maximized the potential of the intervention by providing technical assistance, training to make ecological fertilizers and by assisting with marketing. Farmers doubled production of staple food crops by producing in the dry season. Some systems have ensured continuous production of vegetables in market gardens providing much needed income.

AN AMAZING TESTAMENT TO SUSTAINABILITY

"It was a bold venture for a newly-organized group" stated Hugh Beaty. In his historical booklet MORE THAN A VISION, Hugh outlines the many challenges facing SHARE's first project in 1977 of sending 38 Holstein heifers and 3 bulls by plane to an agricultural college in Mossoro, an impoverished area in arid northeast Brazil where lack of protein was resulting in high infant mortality. David Armstrong had heard about this problem and helped organize local Ontario dairy farmers in the "leap of faith" to make SHARE's first project a reality.

During Hugh & Melba Beaty's two years in Mossoro coordinating the project, they met Sister Ellen by chance at a bus station and learned how this German

Franciscan nun had come to Mossoro to help homeless street kids. Hugh arranged for some milk from the SHARE cows to go to Ellen's "Home for Poor Children" every day to assist in her program. Some of the offspring from the herd are still auctioned every year to raise funds to maintain the herd of 65 animals and the milk is still 'passed on' to the poor. Ellen stated, "We

are still getting 8 - 10 litres of milk every day."

It was a highlight of the 2018 Brazil monitoring trip to again meet with Ellen and see the descendants of the first SHARE project. Ellen and her sister continue to operate a medical clinic, feed the homeless, provide skills training to youth and necessities to prisoners and the elderly in hospital. Oh...one more thing. Ellen also cares for numerous stray dogs, cats and abandoned donkeys in the "true spirit of St Francis". (Read about Ellen's Lar da Criança Pobre de Mossoró in the internet.)

This is an amazing testament to the sustainability of SHARE's first project and long term 'pass on'!

OUT OF ABJECT POVERTY

In 2018, SHARE visited a well-cared-for cattle herd in El Salvador (see photo on left). There are now 18 cooperatively held herds like this and one or two cattle in 84 communities all as a result of 'pass on' from the 8 original herds funded by SHARE over 15 years ago. In 2012, SHARE funded cattle for a new dairy co-op in Guatemala that has used 'pass on' to new members to increase the herd. Families have nutrition and income from cheese sales. (See photo on right.)
